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
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### SCHOOL NOTES.

### FOOTBALL.

It seems somewhat late to give an account of football matches when publishing our Summer number of the Magazine, but as three interesting matches were played after the publication of our last issue, it is perhaps well to have a record of them.

#### SCHOOL v. GUISBORO' HOCKEY CLUB.

This match was played on the School ground on April 9th, and resulted in a grand win for the School by 4 goals to 2. And although the boys had to meet much heavier opponents, they played with great dash from start to finish and gained their victory by excellent combination backed up by steady play on the part of the backs. By far the most prominent of the visitors was Roy Merryweather, an Old Guisborian, who last season played for University Hospital in London. On this occasion his dribbling and shooting were a treat to watch. He scored both goals for the Hockey men. Up to half time the game was very fast and very evenly contested, Roy Merryweather and Watson scoring for their respective sides, Watson's goal being the result of an excellent individ-

ual effort. After half time the better training of the boys began to tell, and Annett ii., Watson and Lancaster found the net for the School, while R. Merryweather scored again for the visitors, the game ending as stated above.

### CRICKET.

This they have certainly done. There has been a steady improvement week by week in batting and bowling. Fielding is still the weak point, though we are pleased to say that fewer catches have been dropped than usual. We should like to point out again as we have so often pointed out in this Magazine, the great importance of fielding. We suggest that it would be an excellent plan if the Captain would take out the team for 5 or 10 minutes every day, to practise catching,

picking up the ball quickly and smartly returning it. So far our season has been most successful, and this success is due in no small measure to the excellent bowling of Lancaster, Pybus and Ward.
