#### SCHOOL NOTES.

**I**T is with the most sincere regret that we record in this number of our Magazine, the death of Sir J. W. Pease, the late Chairman of the Governors of the School. For a great number of years he took the keenest interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of our Institution.

It was in a great measure owing to his interest that our beautiful buildings were erected in 1887; and when in 1898 it was found necessary to make some additional accommodation owing to the increase in the numbers of boys, Sir Joseph Pease entered heart and soul into the matter, and by his generous liberality and active personal interest contributed largely to the construction of the new large Class-room which forms such an adornment to our School.

We miss him as our Governor, but we miss him more as our friend; and while we remember with gratitude his many services to our School, we would offer our sincere sympathy to his family, which has sustained so great a loss.

We always look forward to the Summer term, partly because there is an expectancy of long bright days, and great feats with

bat and ball, and partly because there is in fine weather an opportunity for the boarders to get out after evening preparation for some good games in the field. (French cricket seems to be the great game.) This term, however, which began on April 27th, has not been favourable for out-door games. The first month was very cold. Then one or two bright days raised our hopes, but they were soon dashed to the ground by cloudy skies and lengthy showers, and we have so often sighed.

Sports Day, a full account of which will appear in our next issue, was fine for which we were very grateful.

Our readers will be interested to hear that we hope during the holidays to carry out the building of the Science Laboratory, so that we may be fully equipped for Practical Science work when we resume work in September. This building, with the necessary equipment, will cost £200. About £75 has been already promised, and the County Council grant towards equipment will be about £65, so that we still require about £60 to meet the cost which the new addition involves. An appeal has been made to the public for help; and as we believe that many Old Boys would be glad to do something for their old School, a special appeal is being made to them. We would ask present boys to call the

attention of parents to the scheme; perhaps they might feel inclined to give a helping hand. Any amounts however small, will be thankfully received.
