EDITORIAL.

"Happy is the nation that has no history!" Is this equally true of a school? Undoubtedly this School has a length of history in the past but we find it difficult to pick out anything of special note to record in this very present editorial of the "Guisborian." The originator of the above somewhat hackneyed remark wished to describe such a gentle progress in a quiet and unobtrusive way as falls to the lot of nations rarely, of schools generally. Lessons are learnt and said, punishments are done and forgotten, matches are lost and won, events are discussed and dismissed, new truths are gathered and assimilated, weeks pass, 'merit halves' come and go, terms vanish, 'labuntur anni,' and the inner history of a School is to a great extent written, though very frequently the things we cannot record are those most worthy of record.

A School Magazine is quite aware of its own limitations, and, this being the case, it makes no apology for the undivided attention it gives to School affairs, though it would heartily welcome as an additional attraction to its pages any items of interest, or contributions sent in by a Past or Present Boy. Surely 'the itch for scribbling' must attack some of the many who have revelled in the luxuries of Shakspeare or criticize the Grammar of the Local Newspapers.

SHOOTING.

The School has shot 7 rounds lying down at a target representing a regulation size target at 500 yards. There has been great improvement in several individual cases but as a whole the average is not good. It ought not to be difficult to hit a target six inches square at a distance of 10 yards, and yet the number who absolutely failed runs into double figures. This only emphasises still more strongly the need of continual practice not necessarily at shooting, but at keeping a steady hand and making hand and eye work simultaneously, or as near it as possible. There is nothing like range-firing to test the general fitness of a boy's physique. Brain and nerve, hand and eye, must be in the best of condition to enable a boy to do his best. It requires a finer judgement, a greater intellectual effort, a fuller concentration of several powers to score ten 'bulls' at a 1000 yards when a head 'fish tail' wind is blowing than to make a century off Hirst and Haigh, to land a salmon after playing it for two hours, or run a mile under four-and-a-half minutes. All that is necessary, as the Drill Book in beautiful simplicity expresses it, is to align the sights on the mark and press the trigger without any movement of the hand, eye, or arm.

THE CRICKET SEASON.

This season if not as successful as the last when judged from the final results of the matches, has not been altogether unsuccessful. We were beaten twice by Darlington, a very strong team, and twice by Silcoates who have much improved. We had the satisfaction of beating Middlesbrough High School after a very exciting finish, and the delight of inflicting an innings defeat on Coatham. The Old Boys beat us after a good game by four runs. Annett is to be congratulated on his success with the bat, and if he can put more shoulder work into his forward strokes, he will make a lot of runs. Fordham has proved most valuable as a bowler, but he must beware of bowling too fast and sacrificing length and direction to pace. Wallace in batting and bowling has been of considerable assistance. Cricket does not consist at any time of one unalterable style of play. It is as much a fault to play a half volley, that badly wants hitting for four, with great unction back to the bowler, as to hit at and miss a good length ball. The one thing needful is a straight bat. In one direction the team has made a great stride forward. The fielding has on most occasions been very good. The younger members of the team shew considerable promise and should do well.

Guisborough G. S. v. Stockton G. S.

Played at Guisborough on the Town field, May 12th. Stockton won the toss and batted first, but made a very poor stand against the bowling of Fordham and Wallace, being all out for 17. Fordham took 5 wickets for 10 runs, and Wallace 4 for 3 runs. Guisborough batted and made 40, Annett being top scorer with 14. Characters.

Annett (Captain)—Has much improved in his batting and played several sterling innings and his bowling too has been of some use. Has set a good example to his team and done well in the field.

Fordham (Vice-Captain)—A very good fast bowler who has done a lot for the team this term. A good bat and safe field.

Winter—Has not been successful as a batsman owing to nervousness and want of care and patience; a good fielder and safe catch.
