

## SPORTS.

The following account of the Sports is taken from the North Eastern Gazette:

### Guisborough C. C. Sports.

The annual sports of the Guisborough Grammar School were held in the School field on Wednesday. The afternoon was gloriously fine, and there was a fashionable attendance, many charming costumes being worn by the ladies on the grand stand. There was a capital programme. The officials in charge being as follows:—President, Rev. T. F. H. Berwick; starter, J. H. Lowes; timekeeper, H. J. Cupper; judges, Col. Richardson, Dr. Stainthorpe, and A. Garthwaite. The winner of the school challenge cup for obtaining the greatest number of points in the events was T. Winter.

On the conclusion of the sports the prizes were presented to the successful competitors by Mrs. W. Charlton.

The Rev. T. F. H. Berwick, in moving a vote of thanks to Mrs. Charlton for once more coming to their assistance, said he would also include those ladies and gentlemen of the town and district for again giving them the prizes. Year after year they went round with the hat, and it was generally returned full. This year they were not only able to pay all the expenses in connection with the sports, but also any little deficiencies incurred during the year. In conclusion he hoped the boys would show their appreciation of Mrs. Charlton's kindness in the best fashion. (Applause).

Mr. Charlton, J.P., in replying on behalf of Mrs. Charlton, hoped they would not leave the field without giving three hearty cheers for Mr. and Mrs. Berwick for the good work they were doing in the town. This brought a successful and interesting afternoon's sport to a close.

During the afternoon the Guisborough Priory Prize Band discoursed sweet music.

### CRICKET RETROSPECT.

As is well known the present season has not been the best possible for Cricket, and when those who are just beginning to indulge in this pleasant pastime endeavour to shine failures are almost always the result. So with our team, with bad wickets and lack of experience we have not had a very successful season. Another important factor in this was the bad state of the practice pitch. But with those unavoidable failures we won some extremely good games. The fielding of the team as a whole reached a high standard but here there are a few weak units. Seldom do school teams get such a variety of bowling as we did this team—the wily swerving-leg-break of Knight, the medium to fast bowling of Wallace, the length of Clarke, and the googlies of Wright. Batting undoubtedly was the weak point of the team, for with the exception of three players none of the team could be relied on to get many runs. We had two hitters but they seldom did anything. Wallace, as he has learnt to hit loose balls will do well. Winter has a very good idea of the game and should become an excellent bat, while Barker is the most improved player in the XI. The team has been captained well.

We beat Middlesbro' High School twice, though the game on our ground was played in terribly wet weather. For the first time in the records of the School we beat Coatham on their own ground. Stockton beat us twice owing mainly to our bad fielding—and with Silcoates the honours were easy, each team winning away from home. Ayton Friends' School we beat twice after good games. Wallace, Winter, and Barker have been the chief run getters, but all through the team the batting has very much improved, owing chiefly to the excellent example and management of the Captain. Bewick's fielding has been noticeable: on Knight, Wallace, and Clarke fell the brunt of attack and with a little smarter fielding they would have won most matches. The season, on the whole, has been most encouraging and full of promise of good things for the future.

### Characters of the Eleven.

**WALLACE** (Captain).—His batting has improved considerably as he has found out how to hit a loose ball; his bowling has been very useful and his captaincy of the team both on and off the field has been worthy of all praise, and much imitation.

**WINTER** (Vice-Captain).—Has improved greatly since last season and is now one of the team's best bats. He is a good fielder but often drops catches owing to nervousness.

**FAIRBOTHAM**.—Hits out too freely but has improved greatly since last season. A sure catch.

**BEWICK**.—A fair bat but very weak on the leg. A very good fielder at point: has brought off some smart catches.

**KNIGHT**.—Has greatly improved during the season in batting and has bowled with success; should try and manage his natural swerve better.

**BARKER**.—One of the team's most reliable bats, has improved considerably; rather slow in the field.

**PATTINSON**.—Spoils his batting by his anxiety to score; a smart wicket-keeper and a good fielder.

**WRIGHT**.—A useful bat and has bowled well on occasions. Has not improved much through neglecting practice.

**HUTTON**.—A good steady batsman. Would do well if he neglected all flourish and defended his wicket with determination.

**CLARKE**.—A good bat but has met with but little success in a match. A very good bowler when he tries; not a reliable fielder.

**COMINS**.—Improved a great deal towards the latter end of the season in batting. A good catch and will be useful as a bowler.
