

### The Cricket Season.

The Cricket Season has been a fairly successful one; we certainly had some very good games and our totals of wins and losses is nearly equal. The bowling has been the weak spot at times, Clarke though bowling well generally, has not shewn the consistently good form of last season. He has shared with Casson the brunt of the attack. Barker's batting has shewn most marked improvement, and with a little more freedom and desire to punish loose balls he would make many runs. Ackroyd, Clarke, and Thubron have all done good service with the bat, but are somewhat lacking in defensive power. If it were permissible to pick out any particular faults, we should notice a tendency to step away from the wicket on the part of a batsman before the ball is delivered, and also a hesitation in calling and running. The fielding has been smart and steady.

**Characters of the Eleven.**

**CLARKE.**—Very good bowler, but has not bowled with such success as last year. A good bat and very good field.

**CASSON.**—Good bowler; bowls better in practice than in matches. A good bat generally; has played several good innings for the team. Very good field.

**THUBRON.**—A fair bat, and generally makes runs. Should give the ball the full face of the bat. Keeps wicket fairly well.

**CLARKSON.**—Has a very good idea of the game. A fair bat. Has taken some good catches at point.

**HUTCHINSON.**—Should hit the ball with the bat, not let ball hit the bat. A fair field.

**COOKE.**—A poor bat; should learn to play straight. A good catch, but only a fair ground field.

**ACKROYD.**—A fair bat; should watch the ball more. A good catch, but has not fielded so well as he did last season.

**SPIRES.**—A poor bat; should not scoop the ball up so. Was a fair catch last season, but not very successful this.

**WARD ii.**—Promises to become a very fair bowler. A poor field and bat.

**LEVY.**—Bats well in practice, but loses his form in matches. A good ground field, but rather slow in taking catches.

**MAYHEW.**—A poor bat; should stand up to his wicket more. Has bowled well occasionally. A poor field.

**BARKER.**—Batting very much improved; has developed a sound defence, and with more determination to hit loose balls will make many runs. Keen in the field and a useful change bowler.
