

REPORT.

The following is the Report given by the Examiner of the Viva Voce Examination of the Third Form, held this term.

In *Divinity* the knowledge shewn of the first 12 Chapters of St. Mark's Gospel and of the 2nd Book of Kings was very fair. Scarth and Varty i. in the Upper Division and Baker i and Baker ii in the Lower made the best answers.

In *English Literature* they all knew by heart the 1st Canto of Scott's *Lay of the Last Minstrel* and had grasped its meaning. Scarth, Varty i, Quainton, and Heseltine were the best. The boys of this Form also wrote out a story which was read out to them. Twelve reproduced it in good English and with correct punctuation. In Dictation five boys had no mistakes at all and six others only one or two.

In *History* they showed a fair knowledge of the Stuart Period. Carter and Quainton in the Upper Division, Baker i and Baker ii and Collett in the Lower answered well.

In the *Geography* of Great Britain nearly all gave one good answer and were able to identify places on a blank outline map.

In *Elementary Latin Grammar and Sentences* the whole of the Upper Division with one exception answered readily and correctly; so also did Donaldson, Baker i, and Rees in the Lower Division. Precisely the same remark may be made about *Elementary French* with the addition of the name of Collett.

In *Mathematics* the Algebra was weak. Arithmetic was very fair. In Geometry one boy wrote out a theorem correctly and eight boys did two geometrical constructions well and neatly.

The Sports were held on July 27th in weather which, though rain had been threatening all the morning, became unexpectedly summerlike. The number of entries was well up to the average.

We were very pleased to see the large gathering of friends and parents which must have far surpassed other years. Pattinson ii ran very well in the $\frac{1}{2}$ mile and Robinson i deserves mention for his plucky running in the mile. Our thanks are due to the judges for their keen services and to Mrs. Pickering who so kindly came to present the prizes to the successful competitors.

CRICKET.

Characters of the Team.

MOORE (Captain)—Has improved in every department of the game, bowling with considerable success; has set an excellent example of keenness to his team.

THUBRON (Vice-Captain)—A good bat, but at times rather too eager to get runs quickly. Has bowled very well but on some occasions has tried to bowl too fast.

LECKENBY—Must learn to play with a straight bat and not try and hit out at every ball. Fairly good in the field and a safe catch.

WARD ii—A promising bat and a good catch in the slips.

BARKER—Very good both in batting and fielding; has good defensive powers.

FORSTER—Has bowled very steadily throughout the season and on some occasions with great success. A very good bat.

ACKROYD—Has fielded very well indeed at point on every occasion, and has greatly improved with the bat this season.

MAYHEW—Did fairly well with the bat at the beginning of the term, but is too frightened of a leg ball; a very poor field.

FISHER—Has kept wicket fairly well this season but must learn to use his hands more to stop the ball, and not be content with just letting the ball hit him. A fairly steady bat.

GARWOOD—A useful bat, but is greatly handicapped by his size. Very smart in the field.

CARTER—A fairly good field and a safe catch, but must play with a straight bat.
