Second Eleven.

More and more the School is showing its vitality and ability in ever-widening spheres, but the mainspring of this machine is, as was said by the Headmaster and Dr. Alington at the Sports—Loyalty and Service.

SCHOOL NEWS.

"Forsan et haec olim meminisse iuvabit."

A meeting of the Committee for the allocation of the profits of the Tuck Shop was held in the Library on July 9th. Those present were: Dr. W. W. Stainthorpe (chairman), the Headmaster, D. Bragg, Esq., H. L. Savage, Esq., H. Waller and P. G. Owston. It was proposed by H. Waller and seconded by P. G. Owston—

"That the profits of the Tuck Shop be employed for the provision of gates for the entrance to the School drive."

The motion, and the plans submitted, were unanimously adopted. We owe the deepest gratitude to Dr. Stainthorpe for making all the arrangements for the construction and erection of the gates.

In the early part of the term, a small party from the VIth Form visited Messrs. Sadler's works at Middlesbrough, where the sulphuric and hydrochloric acid plants were inspected.

Particularly to be remarked upon was the unusually extensive view of Middlesbrough and dockland from the Glover towers—each as big as a small cinema. The "highlight" of the visit, however, was the coal-tar distillation plant, with its multifarious products ranging from petrol to moth-balls, from carbolic acid to timber preservatives and fertilisers.

On Ascension Day, the School as usual attended a service in the Parish Church; the address was given by the Rev. A. H. Waton of Marske and the service was conducted by the Rev. A. G. Wilken.

As the race for the Wetherhead Cup, for which we usually send two competitors, was on the same day as our own Sports, we were unable to make any entry.

Not only did the School celebrate the Coronation of King George VI by holiday-making, but some of its members took part in a Torchlight Procession in the evening; afterwards, they attended a fireworks display in the Applegarth. In spite of the somewhat inclement weather, the proceedings were very successful and afforded a good means of celebrating the memorable occasion.

Much interest has been shown in the new buildings at Ayton Friends' School. Early in July, we contributed to their New Buildings Fund, and on July 16th the Headmaster, Mr. Bragg, Mr. Thomas and the Prefects attended a bricklaying ceremony.

We have contributed also one penny a week each for three weeks towards the Association for the Welfare of the Basque Children Refugees, at present situated at Hutton Hall.

THE MODEL AERO CLUB.

The Club is gradually becoming financially sound and all that is needed now is better support from the members of the School. At present, we have only eight planes and, therefore, have found it difficult to hold competitions. It is hoped that next term will see a far larger membership.

THE SECRETARY.

"S.S. BROOKWOOD."

The last letter from S.S. "Brookwood" unfortunately arrived too late for publication in last term's "Guisborian."

Commencing on December 19th, the S.S. "Brookwood," after fifty days, arrived at Bunbury, one hundred miles south of Freemantle. On the return journey, the ship touched at Durban and Dahar before heading for London.

Mr. Clegg, the second officer, described to us the effects of passing through a cyclone, which they experienced east of Durban. Another rough passage he described was the previous journey to Montreal on which the ship encountered almost continuous western gales, with the temperature, at one point, down to 2° F., when the ship was coated with ice and fires had to be lit everywhere to thaw the steam pipes. Grain loaded at Montreal was discharged at Manchester, whence we obtained an excellent description of the Ship Canal with its "lift" of about 60 feet in 35 miles, by means of four locks.

Also enclosed were some photographs of the ship in dry dock at Durban, taken in 1935.

We wish Captain Sutherland and his crew "bon voyage" at the same time as echoing the hope of the Adoption Society that Captain Hamill will enjoy a pleasant leave.

House Match Final. Chaloner v. Pursglove. June 9th.

If Chaloner were to win the shield for the sixth successive time, it was essential that they should win this match, for Pursglove needed only ten points. Waller, as against Bruce, succeeded in winning the toss and again decided to field.

Pursglove started disastrously on a rapidly drying wicket. Their opening batsmen were dismissed without a run on the board. But Hatfield and Noyes showed much more confidence, and attacking the bowling with some vigour, scored 69 runs for the third wicket, before Noyes was caught at square leg. Martin gave Hatfield admirable support with an obstinate 31 not out. In his 74, Hatfield gave only one chance, when he had not scored a run. The innings closed at the formidable total of 143 runs.

The decrease in the number of books borrowed this term is partly accounted for by the fine weather which draws the boys out to cricket, and the urgent need for study for the examinations which are being held at the end of the term. We expected such a drop in our numbers, therefore, but we did not anticipate that Form Upper Remove would smash all records of the School and produce an achievement which will not be beaten. Their contribution was nil; a fact which we deplore and which we cannot understand, for this form from its very beginning in the School has borrowed the least books of any form. A comparison of figures for the last two years will perhaps show the deplorable disregard of the library's facilities by the boys who now constitute Form Upper Remove. For the last two years these boys have borrowed 114 books, while Form V has never borrowed less than that number in one term.

THE LIBRARIANS.

THE SPORTS, 1937.

This year the event was awaited with more than usual interest, for on it hung the destiny of the shield. Throughout the term enthusiasm waxed high, and training was entered upon with more than usual vigour, creating hopes of records and great achievements.

June 30th dawned to the accompaniment of rain, which even at ten o'clock seemed as though it was going to wash out the Sports. However, our record of choosing fine sports days was not to be blemished, for by noon, bright sunshine was driving away any lingering threats of rain, and at two o'clock, in ideal weather, to the strains of a selection from "The Pirates of Penzance," the first event commenced. Microphonic apparatus had been previously installed, and musical accompaniment added stimulus to the despairing competitors. Fortunately, B.B.C. scouts were not present or perhaps certain members of the Staff might have been enrolled as B.B.C. sports commentators, such was their efficiency in utilizing this device.

On the whole, the Sports were very successful. Training was rewarded by the establishment of records, and keen competition delayed the deciding stroke in favour of Pursglove until the Senior Relay Race, which was almost the final event.

The attendance was good, as was the tea obtainable in the marquee on the field. Here the less fortunate competitors repaired to collect their only spoils after the distribution of prizes, which took place in front of the pavilion.

The Headmaster opened with an account of the year's work, emphasizing especially the team work and loyalty which had manifested itself in every department. In a humorous speech, Dr. Alington, the Dean of Durham, contrasted the ever-varying opinions of schoolmasters on matters of education, and stressed service as the essential quality of a gentleman. He committed a very grievous wrong, however, in doubting the supremacy of Yorkshire over all other counties, and was effectively corrected by Lord Gisborough, who proposed a vote of thanks. This was spontaneously given, and applause was doubly vigorous when the Dean held up his hand and asked the boys and masters to bear patiently the infinite torture of a merit half. The speech of Col. Penry Williams concluded a happy and memorable day, which marked the pinnacle of a very successful year.
