

EDITORIAL.

The past term, with the obvious exception of the Sports, has been strikingly eventless in character. This is explained, perhaps, by the necessity for steady and prolonged study which is an annual feature of School life in the term preceding the public examinations. Although the number of entries for the above is noticeably less than last year's—ten for the Higher School Certificate (three at a subsidiary standard) and twenty-three for the School Certificate—we anticipate no equivalent lapse in the number of successes.

The spirit of progress which has animated School events for so long past has had its expression this term in the opening of the new gates at the foot of the School drive. It is our sincere desire to thank Dr. W. W. Stainthorpe for the interest he so willingly displayed in their construction and Sir Alfred Pease for his kind consent to officiate at their opening.

The athletic branch of School activities reached its culmination on the 29th June, our annual Sports and Speech Day. Upon that occasion, in spite of weather conditions which earlier in the day threatened to mar the proceedings, and despite the impending gloom for the Senior School of the approaching examinations, a remarkably successful function was carried through without a hitch.

The season's cricket has been notable for the achievement of our Second Eleven in defeating Darlington Grammar School. This is unprecedented in the annals of the School: it was, however, a well-deserved success in view of the consistent standard which the team has maintained. It is perhaps needless to add that the First Eleven suffered no serious lapse from its usual run of success.

This term will witness the closing of the Preparatory Department and the departure of Miss Roughley. The regret we feel at her departure is alleviated, however, by the prospect of her marriage to Mr. Howell who left the School staff two terms ago. In this edition of *The Guisborian*, at the close of the School year, we wish to give them both our very best wishes for their future happiness.

SCHOOL NEWS

"Forsan et haec olim meminisse iuvabit."

We offer our heartiest congratulations to E. Alderson, who has been awarded a Major Open Scholarship in Arts at Reading University. He takes with him our best wishes for his continued success.

On Thursday, May 26th, the School attended the annual Ascension Day Service at the Parish Church. The address was given by the Rev. A. B. Carter, Vicar of Stokesley.

As mentioned elsewhere in this issue, the Preparatory Class is being closed at the end of this term. Miss Roughley, who has been Prep. mistress for six years, will be missed by the Main School, particularly for her work behind the scenes at our annual productions of "G. & S." operas, when she was very active in the designing and painting of scenery. Besides this, Miss Roughley on two occasions produced an entertainment by the Prep. We repeat our wishes for her future happiness.

The new entrance gates to the School drive, "in commemoration of the Coronation of their Majesties King George and Queen Elizabeth, and in memory of that Queen Elizabeth in whose reign and under whose charter Robert Pursglove in 1561 first founded the School," were completed and erected during the Easter holidays. Their dedication and formal opening took place on Thursday, 19th May. The School having lined up outside the gates, they were first dedicated by the Rev. A. G. Wilken, Rector of Guisborough; this was the first public function which he attended as a Governor of the School. The Headmaster then thanked all those through whose help the gates were erected, particularly Mrs. Stainthorpe who designed them, Mr. Robson, the blacksmith, and the contractor, Mr. Richardson. The gates were constructed at Belmont Forge, while the stone for the pillars originally formed part of the Priory, having been built into a recently demolished cottage in Guisborough on the Priory's destruction. The old red brick wall has been replaced by one of stone, which was obtained through the generosity of Mr. Bramley. The mainspring in the preparations was Dr. Stainthorpe, for it was he who first suggested

the gates and made all arrangements for their construction and erection. The gates were then opened by Sir Alfred Pease, Chairman of the Governors, who expressed pleasure that the project had been conceived and executed entirely in Guisborough. The School then filed through the gates and reformed on the drive. Mr. Savage then proposed a vote of thanks to Sir Alfred for opening the gates.

The Reading Recital.

Mr. Mackarness gave a very interesting reading recital to Forms IVa, IVb, III and Remove, in the School Hall on Wednesday, 8th June. The programme varied very much and, because of this, the boys were very interested.

A lecture on words opened the recital. Simple words, he told us, such as "yes" or "no" could be pronounced in several different ways. These were illustrated by Mr. Mackarness, the word "no" was pronounced ten times, each time differently. Sounds, he told us, were small matters which entered a man's brain and knocked open trap-doors, from which came pictures. These pictures illustrated the sounds which had entered the brain. Sounds of words, he said, were like the notes in music, and these he illustrated by several long Greek words. Their sounds went up and down, just as the notes in music. He said that words had been discovered by former generations and had been left on the stage of life for other generations; but, of course, new words had been discovered later. Words also had a life like men and beasts.

Ten varied poems followed this very interesting lecture. The first poem, "Going up to London," was by Miss Nancy Turner. This was followed by "After London," this time by an Englishman, J. D. C. Pellow. "Robinson Crusoe's Story" was very humorous, as it was an American version by C. Carryl. John Masefield's "A Ballad of Cape St. Vincent" was an interesting poem. "Frankie's Trade" by Rudyard Kipling, told how Drake became an excellent sailor; another of Kipling's poems, "Cold Iron," followed. A ghostly poem, "Who is in the next room?" by Thomas Hardy was next. "The Song of the Dark Waters" was about a negro who wondered for what purpose he would go to heaven, by Thomas Hardy. Mr. Mackarness delighted us all by reading a poem called "The Two Lamplighters" in Yorkshire dialect. An excellent recital ended with "Fratri delectissimo" by John Buchan (Lord Tweedsmuir).

We were very grateful to Mr. Mackarness for interesting us all with his reading recital. We all hope to have the pleasure of being visited by him in the near future and we will give him a warm welcome if he does so.

THE SPORTS, 1938.

It was usual in former years to await this annual event with more than usual interest since, as a general rule, the destiny of the Shield had not been previously decided. This year, Pursglove having made quite sure by a decisive victory, the Sports lacked this additional stimulus, but desire for revenge in the vanquished and the will to retain supremacy in the victors supplied the enthusiasm which invariably accompanies this phase of the School's activities.

Weather conditions during the early part of the day were far from satisfactory and it was the general opinion that a series of fine sports-days was at last due to be interrupted. This was a mistaken idea, however, and the afternoon was fine although the wind was troublesome to spectators and competitors alike.

The Sports themselves were very successful and, in spite of adverse winds, the standard of both track and field events suffered no serious lapse from its usual level. An outstanding achievement, in view of the weather conditions, was the establishment in the Quarter-Mile of a time several seconds better than the previous record. The attendance was good and the School Hall was occupied to its full capacity when an adjournment was made to the prize-giving.

The Headmaster, who opened with an account of the year's work, extended a hearty welcome to Sir Bedford Dorman who had consented to present the prizes. Sir Bedford, in his speech which followed, declared that ours was a school which had often come to his notice as a body imbued with the spirit of progress. He made a special appeal to the boys of the School to consider the prospect of agriculture as a profession and maintained that scientific agriculture was a branch of knowledge which, in the future, would become more and more essential to the life of the world. Sir Alfred Pease who proposed a vote of thanks, regretted the absence of the late Lord Gisborough whose rôle at School functions he had now assumed, and, in a very humorous speech, impressed upon Sir Bedford as Chairman of the Education Committee the necessity to remember not only passively but actively the existence of Guisborough Grammar School. The speech of Dr. W. W. Stainthorpe concluded a very happy day, worthy of the long succession of similar days in the history of our School.
