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EDITORIAL.

This term, the difficulties and inconveniences which are inseparably attendant upon war, have crowded thickly upon the School, no less than upon the rest of the world. Our tiny community, being, as it were, a representation in miniature of civilised society in this country, has been forced, equally with that society, to modify its activities to conform with the demands of changed conditions.

Thus, we have been compelled to spend considerable time in perfecting and rehearsing our arrangements for the protection of the School from enemy air attack. While we have certainly no desire to demonstrate it in actual experience, we are confident that our arrangements will prove adequate and effective.

As far as concerns our games and amusements, also, war has brought little deterioration in our standard. Both First and Second XI's have distinguished themselves, and have well maintained the high standard set in previous years. Such, indeed, is their prowess that a challenge presented to the Staff has been declined.

The contest for the Shield lacks nothing of its usual interest, for after a hard-fought struggle, the final issue seems still undecided. The result, therefore, will eventually be decided by the Sports, which, though unavoidably held rather later and planned on a somewhat smaller scale than in previous years, will thus command no less attention.

In conclusion, therefore, considering our activities as a whole, we may still with justice claim to have maintained our School life untouched by the disasters of the outside world.

SCHOOL NEWS.
