SCHOOL NEWS.

This term has seen the formation of a School Flight of the Air Training Corps, under the command of Mr. Routh and Dr. Meek. It is part of the Town Squadron No. 1336, but has a flight number of its own—1501 Flight. It augurs well for the future of the flight that many of its keenest members are boys who will be staying at School for some time to come. Further details of its progress will be found elsewhere.

The School is now engaged in the production of bigger, bonnier and brighter boys. Each break most of the members of the School line up for their daily ration of one-third of a pint of milk, which is served by an untiring band of Sixth Formers. The scheme is supervised by Mr. Savage.

After the departure of Mr. Swift, we this term offered a warm welcome to Mr. K. Spedding, B.Sc. (Dunelm). Mr. Spedding performs the duties of P.T. and general master.

Half-way through the term the new air-raid shelters were brought into use. They are four in number and hold fifty boys each, thus comfortably sheltering the whole School.

During the term we have received several visits from masters who are now in H.M. Forces. These are Pilot-Officer S. M. Smith, Aircraftsman G. Farrington, Sergeant G. Collins and Corporal W. P. Cooper.

THE SCOUT TROOP.

This term has seen the return to our outdoor activity. A number of visits have been paid to Hutton and a good deal of scouting work has been done. Several wide games have been played at Hutton, although the bracken until recently was scarcely high enough to allow of their being really effective. Most of the recruits have now passed their Tenderfoot tests and are well on the way to gaining their Second Class Badges.

Once again it is doubtful whether we will be able to hold a camp, since the difficulty of obtaining food is very great. But we hope that the younger members of the troop at least will spend some time under canvas before their school life ends.

1501 FLIGHT, AIR TRAINING CORPS.

Regularly, after school, on certain days of the week, you may hear the stamp of many feet in the quad and various hoarse bellowings. It is No. 1501 (G.G.S.) Flight, Air Training Corps, on parade.

Formed early in May, it is now some 45 strong. The officers are Flying-Officers Routh and Meek, R.A.F.V.R.

Several subjects are being taught, in order that the cadets, when they enter the Royal Navy or the Royal Air Force, will not be mere greenhorns. In addition to the mathematics and P.T. taught in school, Morse code, aircraft recognition, foot drill and armament are among the syllabus required for the proficiency certificate.

We hope to receive uniforms and badges in the near future. Visits to Thornaby Aerodrome are also planned, in order that cadets may see something of war-time operational flying and the way in which an aerodrome is run.

Several of the senior cadets will be leaving at the end of term, but the efficiency of the flight will be in no way impaired if the keenness and enthusiasm which exist to-day are continued.

Our thanks are due to Mr. Fox, Sergeant Firth and Corporal Robson, H.G., and Mr. Osborne of the R.O.C., who have given many interesting lectures and a good deal of practical instruction. Several lectures have also been given by the Squadron Commander, Flight-Lieutenant Debenham.

THE WEATHER STATION.

This term, after a lapse of over a year, the Weather Station report again takes its time-honoured place in the "Guisborian." All our losses in instruments have been replaced and the screen has been removed to a less vulnerable position. We are glad to welcome a new group of observers from the Scouts, namely: L. M. May was a noticeably cold month and 10 deg. F. of frost was registered on the 15th. The cold spell continued into the middle of June, when the weather became much warmer, culminating in a record maximum temperature of 89 deg. F. on the 22nd.
