

We should like to take this opportunity of congratulating Wilson on his H.S.C. result, in which he gained Distinctions in Physics and Chemistry, and a "good" in Mathematics. As a result of this, he was awarded a State Scholarship tenable at a University. To this has been added a County Major Scholarship. These achievements are comparable with those of W. C. Brice in 1938.

The biggest event of the term has undoubtedly been the formation of the "G.G.S. Choir," which consists, at full strength, of five tenors, nine basses, eleven altos and two dozen trebles. Their efforts materialised on Sunday, 13th December, when they took part in a Carol Service held in Guisborough Parish Church. The soloist was Miss Helen Anderson, whom the School had heard earlier in the term at a C.E.M.A. Concert. A School Carol Service is also to be held on Thursday, December 17th.

Early this term, members of the School were privileged to hear a concert given by the C.E.M.A. (Council for the Encouragement of Music and the Arts). The performers were Winifred Small (violin), Kathleen Cooper (pianoforte) and Helen Anderson (soprano). Miss Small, accompanied by Miss Cooper, commenced the programme with a sonata by Locatelli, and later gave us a group of pieces by Tartini, Sibelius and Szolt. Miss Anderson's expressive vocal powers were heard to advantage in songs by Schubert, which were repeated when a similar concert was given to the public later in the day.

The term was also notable for a visit paid to us by Major Fairfax-Blakeborough, who is a distinguished figure in this part of the world. His lecture concerned Yorkshire dialect and customs, and was liberally sprinkled with personal reminiscences and anecdotes. It was enjoyed by the assembled School, and also by a group of visitors from the town.

The various "Friday Afternoon Activities" are being held once every two or three weeks with all the usual enthusiasm. The Field Club, under Miss Forsaith, sent 40 lbs. of rose hips to Leeds, to be made into syrup; and the "Kingswood"—which, you will remember, is the ship we adopted some years ago—received seven knitted garments from the School. The Chess Club's feverish crescendo of excitement culminated in Dr. Hartog's playing seven games at once. The results of this experiment are being guarded with a sinister secrecy.

The activities of the Spotters' Club have been seriously curtailed owing to the fact that they have no bulb for the epidiascope. It is, however, hoped that one will be obtained soon. At the end of last term, a Third Class Test was held, and twelve members were successful. These successes were mainly due to the untiring efforts of Mr. W. Y. Whitely, R.O.C., to whom the Club is greatly indebted.

Miss Burns, our Assistant French Mistress, left us last term; and in her stead, occupying the post of Temporary Assistant Master, we are pleased to welcome Mr. H. O. Arnott, of Hutton Gate. Mr. Arnott acquired his B.A. (Honours in English) at the University of Birmingham. Miss Burns, we hear, is now at Haslingden Grammar School in Lancashire. We wish her every happiness.

By way of postscript, may we suggest that the Half-Term Holiday—the first within living memory, for we do not count that fiasco in 1940—was appreciated by masters and boys alike? And in conclusion, we should like to wish all our readers a very happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year; and, to those of us who are lucky enough to have one, a thoroughly enjoyable Christmas holiday.

BRUCE v. PURSGLOVE. Played on Wednesday, December 9th.

Bruce won the toss and decided to take advantage of the strong wind by kicking towards the Police Station. Pursglove opened their account in the first few minutes through Brady ii. Although Pursglove had most of the play after this, the Bruce defence held firm and just before half-time Forrest brought the scores level after Gibb had previously crashed the ball against the cross-bar.

Pursglove, who now had the advantage of the wind, took command of the game and the Bruce forwards saw little of the ball. Thomas figured prominently in Bruce's defence, but the Pursglove forwards, who were in almost constant possession of the ball, increased the lead comfortably before full-time. The scorers in this half were Brady ii (2), Brady i, Watson i, and one own goal.

Junior House Matches.

In the first half, both teams were fairly even, with the Chaloner defence holding firm. Their opponents' defence was rather erratic, however, and Harrison iii was able to score the only goal of the half for Chaloner.
