Photographs were taken of the Headmaster in his study, of the staff, prefects and the various forms individually, in addition, the various sports teams, the Scout Troop, the laboratory and library—a scene of honest endeavour—the school buildings and Priory were all photographed. The Old Boys have kindly presented prizes for the most original out-of-school activity. Many and various entries have been received. We do not envy the Judges! Prizes are to be presented to the junior and senior winners on Sports Day.

We were honoured to have His Grace, the Archbishop of York to give the address at the unveiling ceremony of the School Memorial. UNVEILING AND DEDICATION OF THE WAR MEMORIAL

The Service of Dedication was held in the Parish Church and was a moving and impressive ceremony. It was a day of perfect Spring weather so that the buglers were able to stand outside the South Door of the Chancel to sound the Last Post and Reveille. The School Choir sang the hymns and psalm. The body of the Church was well filled by the rest of the School and by a large congregation which included the relatives and friends of those commemorated, and members of the Governing Body, and of the Old Boys' Association. Wreaths were hung below the Memorial by the Chairman of the Association and by the Captain of the School. The Archbishop's address was impressive in its directness; he stressed the Christian teaching of hope to the mourners and the duty of those of us who still lived to strive for understanding between nations: for this he welcomed the Atlantic Pact. The dominant note of the service was of praise and thanksgiving.

Much praise has been received for the beauty of the memorial itself and some of this credit must go to the splendid work done by the makers, Messrs. G. Maile & Son, Ltd., of London. It now hangs in the School Hall on a green background which provides a splendid setting for it. The Chairman of the Association, the Headmaster, and others, also received many tributes on the excellence of the service and the School Choir.

The financial statement of the War Memorial Fund appears at the end of the *Guisborian* from which you will see there is an estimated deficiency of £12:10:8. The Fund is still open and if you wish to make a donation you are respectfully asked to do so as soon as possible so that the Accounts can be closed.
